














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Welcome from the Dean

About this service

This Service of Welcome and Inauguration of the Ministry of the 108th Bishop of Rochester is a celebration of the life of the Diocese and an affirmation of our common calling as the people of God, as Bishop Jonathan is welcomed to his Cathedral and Diocese. The various liturgical, symbolic, and legal elements are woven into the four parts of the service, with music, hymns and songs from Cathedral and Diocesan musicians.

The Gathering and Welcome: Once the people are gathered, Bishop Jonathan knocks on the doors of the Cathedral and is asked about his calling to this ministry by school children from a Diocesan school. The Archbishop's Mandate is presented and read aloud, Bishop Jonathan makes the declaration of assent and swears the customary oaths on the Coverdale Bible (one of the treasures of the Cathedral's Library), and representative gifts of welcome are presented.

The Inauguration of Ministry: Bishop Jonathan is placed in the episcopal seat by the Archdeacon of Canterbury (the Archbishop's representative). After being anointed, Bishop Jonathan takes up the Diocesan Crozier, the symbol of his authority and care in the Diocese. He is presented to the people and greets civic and ecumenical guests.

The Liturgy of the Word: We listen to the scriptures, Bishop Jonathan preaches, and we hold his vision for the Diocese before God in prayer.

The Sending Out: As we go out in faith, Bishop Jonathan blesses us for mission and, finally, blesses Rochester and all the communities of the Diocese from the doors of the Cathedral.

Message from Bishop Jonathan

Toni and I are so grateful for the wonderful welcome we have already enjoyed in the Diocese of Rochester, and are deeply aware of the enormous privilege and responsibility of being called here by God. We look forward greatly to getting to know you and to working with you in the years ahead.

Today's service is taking place in circumstances that none of us would have imagined even a few short days ago. The passing of Her Late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II has brought our Church, our nation and the Commonwealth into a period of deep sadness and mourning. Our prayers are with King Charles and all the members of the Royal Family as they grieve her loss, and will continue to be so in the days and years ahead.

Queen Elizabeth was a beacon of Christian faith, hope and love throughout her reign and we owe her an incalculable debt of gratitude for her remarkable leadership of both nation and Commonwealth right to the end of her life. Through all the ups and downs of the last seventy years, The Late Queen was a rock and sure foundation at the heart of our nation, leading by her example of dedicated and selfless service.

As a result, the place of the monarchy in the affections of the people of the United Kingdom has been strengthened and assured, and King Charles, as he has said, will seek to follow her example and build on his mother's legacy in the years to come. This will involve both continuity and change both in the monarchy and in our nation, and we assure him today of our loyalty, love and prayers.

I am mindful of the part the Church has to play in this time of uncertainty and transition, not least given all the turmoil that our world has been experiencing over the last few years. Part of our calling will be to embody continuity through our faithfulness to the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, as we seek to proclaim the Gospel afresh in a new generation; and part of our calling will be to embrace change, so that the Gospel may be heard and received among that new generation.

With that in mind, I will be focusing my new ministry as Bishop of Rochester on three key priorities, which seek to build on the Diocese of Rochester's vision, "Called Together". These priorities can be summarised in three words: "Grow, Change, Serve".

God longs for his reign of justice and peace to flourish in our world, and how we live as followers of Jesus, seeking God's kingdom in all that we do and speaking of the good news of Christ, really matters if the Church is to further the cause of God's reign and to **grow** both spiritually and numerically. Being disciples of Jesus requires us to be ready to **change**, as we seek to grow in his likeness and to follow him in a fast-changing world, and that in turn means being ready to **serve** our communities and the wider world, demonstrating the compassion of Christ and our commitment to God's reign of justice and peace.

None of this is new. This is the calling of the Church in each generation: to live and to proclaim the good news of Jesus Christ so that all people may be reconciled to God and experience his love for themselves. We as churches and as individuals are called to be beacons of Christian faith, hope and love to the communities we serve, speaking humbly yet boldly of the good news of God's love and of the hope that we have through Christ for this life and the life to come.

Our nation needs us as Christians to be faithful to our calling, especially in this time of turmoil and uncertainty. The Late Queen spoke openly about her faith and the strength she drew from it, and we should do the same, demonstrating by word and deed the love of God for all people, and working with people of all faiths and none for the good of all and the care of creation. What motivates us is the love of God in Christ, and what sustains us is the hope we have in Him.

Thank you for your support and prayers as we start out on this new journey together.

Archbishop's Charge

To Our well beloved in Christ, **Jonathan Robert Gibbs**, now Bishop and Pastor of the Diocese of **Rochester**, Greeting

... As the Crown Nominations Commission considered prayerfully and carefully the call of the new Bishop of Rochester to share the historic and eternal gospel with a changing world, and to encourage all Christians in their witness so that more people become disciples of Jesus Christ, they discerned an especial sense of urgency around tasks and ministries which I now set before you, to guide you as you prepare to take up your new office.

As a Bishop within the Church of England you are called to share in the ministry of the Gospel of Christ, proclaiming His promise of hope and eternal life in a world of death and despair. It's in this broken world that God calls you to the servant leadership which guards the flock of Christ, exercising the ministry of a shepherd contending for and upholding the unity of the Church, and guiding them in witness and service. In the uncertainty of the world, may Christ strengthen you to confidently live out the vocation to which God has called you and His Church...

As Diocesan Bishop of Rochester you are called to lead the diocese in discerning its particular vision for God's ministry and mission, following His call to care for the sick, the hungry, the imprisoned, the stranger and the orphan around us and, in so doing, proclaiming the Good News of the God who came and lived among us that we might know and share His love for us here on Earth. Jesus who loved all alike, who counted tax collectors and fishermen as friends, invites you to bring people to Christ's table. He calls us to build a church where each living stone is valued.

As Jesus welcomed the children, the sick and the isolated into His family, you are called to lay a place for both the young and the elderly, those who are poor and those who are wealthy, those whom society loves and those whom society despises alike, and to be a safe place where God's children may gather, in all our glorious diversity and difference, and celebrate the image of God in one another. At this critical time in our stewardship of God's creation, may you have creativity to ensure God's people are characterized by the same love for this world that caused our creator to give his Son...

And finally, may you be present and part of your community as our Lord Jesus Christ was, in both the joy of the wedding at Cana and the suffering of the funeral of the widow's son, in sharing hospitality and friendship. May you serve those within it as Christ calls us to, and to care particularly for those who are suffering, distressed and isolated, seeking to ease the burdens of those we serve by our deeds and words.

Jonathan – scripture calls us to 'speak out on behalf of the voiceless, and for the rights of all who are vulnerable' [Prov 31:8], to challenge cultures of hierarchy and deference, and create a space that honours the trust and hope that people place in the church of God. You are called to be a seeker and speaker of truth and justice, and to ensure that the Diocese of Rochester is a place where children and vulnerable adults are safe, and the highest standards of safeguarding are upheld.

Jonathan – all goodness comes from God alone. Tend to your own spiritual life, in prayer and study, that you may hear His word, receive His spirit, and do His work.

So may the Lord of heaven, who gives you the will to undertake these things, give you also the strength to perform them, and by his divine providence may his holy angels succour and defend you on earth, and may his Grace and Blessing be with you at all times. Amen

Declaration and Oaths

Dean

Bishop Jonathan, I ask you, in the presence of God and before this congregation, to make the Declaration of Assent which you in turn will require of those to hold your licence to any office within this diocese.

The Church of England is part of the One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church, worshipping the one true God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. It professes the faith uniquely revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds, which faith the Church is called upon to proclaim afresh in each generation. Led by the Holy Spirit, it has borne witness to Christian truth in its historic formularies, the Thirty-nine Articles of Religion, The Book of Common Prayer and the Ordering of Bishops, Priests and Deacons. In the declaration you are about to make, will you affirm your loyalty to this inheritance of faith as your inspiration and guidance under God in bringing the grace and truth of Christ to this generation and making Him known to those in your care?

Bishop

I, Jonathan Robert Gibbs, do so affirm, and accordingly declare my belief in the faith which is revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds and to which the historic formularies of the Church of England bear witness; and in public prayer and administration of the sacraments, I will use only the forms of service which are authorized or allowed by Canon.

Jusleen Virdee and Nathaniel Rushton, Kings Scholars, present the Coverdale Bible to the Bishop who places his right hand upon it

The Bishop makes the Oath of Allegiance to His Majesty the King, the Oath of Due Obedience to the Archbishop of Canterbury, and the Oath of Fidelity to the Cathedral and Diocese

Bishop

I, Jonathan Robert Gibbs, do swear that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to His Majesty King Charles III, his heirs and successors, according to law: So help me God.

In the Name of God. Amen. I, Jonathan Robert Gibbs, Chosen Bishop of the Church and See of Rochester do profess and promise all due reverence and obedience to the Archbishop and Metropolitical Church of Canterbury and to their successors: So help me God, through Jesus Christ.

I, Jonathan Robert Gibbs, by divine permission Bishop of Rochester (duly elected and confirmed), now commit myself to the mission entrusted to me which I can fulfil only by the grace of Christ. I promise that I will be a faithful pastor and true Father in God to the clergy and people of this Diocese. I solemnly declare that I will observe diligently the Constitution and Statutes of this Cathedral Church, and will encourage and promote its worship and mission. With the help of God, and responding to his liberating love in Christ, I will endeavour to serve all who live or work in the communities of this Diocese of Rochester.

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.

All Glory to you, O Lord.

The apostles gathered around Jesus, and told him all that they had done and taught. He said to them, 'Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest a while.' For many were coming and going, and they had no leisure even to eat. And they went away in the boat to a deserted place by themselves. Now many saw them going and recognized them, and they hurried there on foot from all the towns and arrived ahead of them. As he went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd; and he began to teach them many things. When it grew late, his disciples came to him and said, 'This is a deserted place, and the hour is now very late; send them away so that they may go into the surrounding country and villages and buy something for themselves to eat.' But he answered them, 'You give them something to eat.' They said to him, 'Are we to go and buy two hundred denarii worth of bread, and give it to them to eat?' And he said to them, 'How many loaves have you? Go and see.' When they had found out, they said, 'Five, and two fish.' Then he ordered them to get all the people to sit down in groups on the green grass. So they sat down in groups of hundreds and of fifties. Taking the five loaves and the two fish, he looked up to heaven, and blessed and broke the loaves, and gave them to his disciples to set before the people; and he divided the two fish among them all. And all ate and were filled; and they took up twelve baskets full of broken pieces and of the fish. Those who had eaten the loaves numbered five thousand men.

Immediately he made his disciples get into the boat and go on ahead to the other side, to Bethsaida, while he dismissed the crowd. After saying farewell to them, he went up on the mountain to pray.
